

Project # 1 - Algebra Vocabulary Poster for Display in the Classroom

Select one of the available vocabulary words or group of words and create an attractive poster to be hung in the classroom throughout the semester. The vocabulary word(s) must be legible from 25 feet away, so the letter size is important as well as neatness. The poster must include an example that is relevant to the definition. The definition does not have to be presented on the poster, especially if the example clearly indicates the definition. The poster should be no larger than a small poster board, 14" x 22". I can give you further guidance if you are unsure of how to create your poster. You will present your definition and example to the class.
